Transition Planning: Social Security SSI / Title 19 Medicaid/ Guardianship When and How to Apply? What is the Process?

At age 18, an individual should apply to the Social Security Administration (SSA) for SSI (Supplemental Security Income) and once the SSI has been approved, then apply to the Department of Social Services (DSS) for Title 19/ Medicaid. It is imperative that your son/daughter be eligible for Medicaid in order to receive DDS vocational or day program funding upon graduation. There are different types of Medicaid Programs. In order to be eligible for DDS funding upon graduation, your son/daughter must be enrolled in"HUSKY C" Title 19 Medicaid. This will also qualify them for DDS case management services.

Social Security/ SSI: 1-800-772-1213

- Income-based eligibility program through the Federal Social Security Administration <u>www.ssa.gov</u> In order to be eligible for SSI, an individual must meet certain asset, income and disability status criteria. Please contact the Social Security Administration for more information.
- An SSI application can be made at any time. Usually, it is best to apply when the individual turns 18 years of age. This way the person is considered an adult and it is <u>their</u> income that will be considered versus the families. You can apply before the age of 18; however the parent's income is considered when SSI benefits are provided to a minor child.
- Applying for SSI first, makes the entitlement process go more smoothly. The SSI establishes your son's/daughter's disability and if found eligible, they will be found eligible for Title 19 if they meet the asset limit. You will still need to apply for Title 19 eligibility.

Some tips:

- Make an appointment for an intake meeting with the Social Security Administration (in person is best).
- You can download the application and start working on it before your appointment. It can take several weeks before you are seen and it can be a 3-4 month process.
- Be sure to answer questions, as if your son/ daughter is filling out the information (Example: When asked about "family income", you should be referring to your son/ daughter's income. After age 18, your family income should not be documented in the application).

Title 19/ Medicaid/ HUSKY C:

- Income-base eligibility health insurance program through the **Department of Social Services (DSS).** www.ct.gov/dss
- Important: You need to be enrolled in "HUSKY C" Title 19 Medicaid, in order to receive any DDS funding. When an individual turns 18, they are determined to be an adult and their eligibility for Title 19 is determined by their own assets and income. To be eligible, their assets cannot exceed \$1,600, unless they are working.
- Students should still use parent's insurance as primary insurance.
- If found eligible for SSI, the individual will be found eligible for Title 19. You still need to apply and complete the paperwork and schedule an appointment with the Department of Social Services.

Some Tips:

- A suggestion to ensure DSS counselor is working on the correct Medicaid Program for your son or daughter is to write on top of the application: <u>"The purpose of this</u> <u>application is to become eligible for "HUSKY C" Medicaid, to insure DDS funding."</u>
 - If your son/ daughter is working in a competitive job with competitive wages, but needs to be on Title 19 to be eligible for DDS waiver services, you can request to be on the DSS "S05 Program", which is MED-Connect. This will allow an individual who is employed to earn up to \$6,250 per month or up to \$75,000. per year and still maintain Title 19 health insurance.

It is strongly recommended that you make copies of all application paperwork and documentation for your records, for both SSI and Title 19.

Guardianship:

- Every person in the State of Connecticut who is 18 years of age and older is considered to be an adult that is legally capable of directing his personal decisions. Some individuals with intellectual disabilities might be totally or partially impaired in making these decisions. Full/ plenary or limited guardianship can be appointed by the court, to assist others in decisions.
- The family needs to go to their town's Probate Court to file an application for guardianship. Find your local Probate Court at: www.ctprobate.gov
- The family can file the request 180 days prior to the individual turning 18 years of age.
- Law requires that the court hearing be set within 45 days.
- The fee is \$150. Or you can request to have this fee waived based on your income.
- Once the request begins to be processed, the court will contact DDS to complete a guardianship assessment. DDS will then contact you to schedule the assessment.
- There are 5 areas that are assessed: residence, educational/vocational, release of records, emergency medical/dental and any other specific services necessary to develop or regain to the maximum extent possible the individual's capacity to meet essential requirements.
- A plenary or full guardian will be given all powers set forth in the above assessed areas. Limited guardian will be given only those powers deemed necessary by the Court
- The Court will appoint an attorney to meet with the individual and provide legal counsel during this process to protect their rights. If the individual cannot afford to pay for an attorney, one will be appointed without charge.
- DDS sends the completed assessment to the court. They do not need to be present at the hearing unless requested by the court.

Important!

Your DDS case manager can assist you with the entitlements and Guardianship process. If you are <u>eligible for DDS services</u>, but you do not have an assigned case manager, you can call the **Individual and Family Support Resources Helpline number.** This toll free helpline was established to screen calls and answer questions from families without case management services. Your information will be forwarded to the appropriate DDS employee to assist you with your concerns.
